




Signs of Recovery



- EMPLOYMENT **growth** in 7 out of 10 major industry clusters; construction and tourism are both up 3%.
- WORLD TRADE **increased** in 2011.
- PATENTS and VENTURE CAPITAL continue to **grow**.
- HOUSING prices **increased** 20% in 2012.



Economic Indicators




- Orange County **added** 14,400 JOBS and **awarded** 4,352 HOUSING PERMITS in 2011.

Orange County, 2002-2011





Smartphone Ownership Compared to the General Population, by Income








Upper Level Math and Science Course Enrollment as Percent of Grade 9-12 Enrollment
Orange County, 2011/12





Orange County, 2008-2012





- UC/CSU ELIGIBILITY **increased** to 43%


Dropout Rate, by Race/Ethnicity
Orange County, 2009/10 and 2010/11





Insurance Coverage




Uninsured by Race/Ethnicity, Income, Education and Age



Young Child Health Measures




- PRENATAL CARE rates **dip** to 88.7%.
- ACCIDENTAL DEATHS for children under five continue to trend **downward**.
- After an unusually high number of assault deaths in 2009 (13), in 2010 two deaths were attributed to this cause.
- Nearly 40% of students are OVERWEIGHT: fully 25% are considered to be far **outside the healthy range**.

Young Child Health Measures



- 78% of children are adequately **IMMUNIZED** by age two
- Enrollment in the **IMMUNIZATION REGISTRY** continues to **grow**: roughly 70% of children 0 – 5
- **WHOOPING COUGH** cases **dropped** significantly


Vaccine-Preventable Disease (VPD) Cases or Hospitalizations

Note: VPD includes polio, tetanus, diphtheria, pertussis, hepatitis A, hepatitis B, HIB, mumps, measles, and rubella, plus pneumococcal disease (as of 2003), varicella (chicken pox) hospitalization (as of 2004), and serious influenza hospitalization (as of 2008).



Young Child Economic Wellbeing




- The number of **INSECURELY HOUSED** children appears to be **steadying**.

Orange County, 2008-2012





Community Collaboration




- **Special Feature: Orange County United Way Strategic Plan and Collective Impact Approach**
 - Health

- **Common themes from the community:**
 - Focus on children and families most at risk
 - Improve family self-sufficiency
 - Emphasize prevention and early intervention
 - Build public awareness
 - Long-term commitment is necessary (look at 10-year goals)

Opportunities for Collaboration



- **Credible, reliable population-level data is important foundation for policy decisions.**
- **Currently, Commission uses data from several sources, such as Community Indicators, Conditions of Children, County Health Care Agency, Early Developmental Index**
- **Opportunity to work with other organizations to improve the quality and timeliness of data and leverage new data sources that are available.**
